The bell is a truncated cone in shape, slightly flaring at the mouth, with a trefoil lug (only a stub remains, the rest is missing). There is a perforation at the peak from which the clapper would have been hung. The clapper is no longer present. There is a moulded inscription around the rim reading in Lombardic capitals + CAMPAN THOMEA Thomas' bell. This bell is very similar to one found in London no.126 (Spencer 1998: 123-5).
