At 12 o'clock, a sword, representing i St.Paul meaning it was made in London. At 3 o'clock is a crowned G, meaning it was one of the King Georges. At 6 o'clock is a coffee pot/ ewer meaning it was made by the company of founders. At 9 o'clock, an A for Averdepois, the type of weight.

This system of marks was in use 1590-1826 and London authorised weights were widely used int he provinces. The position of the marks tells you it is George III or George IV before 1826 (Biggs, English Weights p.52)
