A Roman nummus of Constantius II (AD 323-61), the reverse of which is corroded and illegible. At the time of finding the coin was adhering to the surface of a pottery sherd ([WILT-E232C8](#)). It measures 22-23mm and weighs 3.33g, is chipped and with some wear.

Obverse: Pearl diademed draped cuirassed bust right
D N CONSTAN [TIV]S P F AVG

The coin was found, with another ([WILT-203724](#) and fragment [WILT-2057C7](#) which is possibly a Roman coin), in a pit with fourteen iron nails ([WILT-E2A7F2](#)), Roman pottery ([WILT-E232C8](#), [WILT-E19E94](#)), a fragment of Roman spoon ([WILT-250BB8](#)) and copper alloy ([WILT-254207](#)) and lead ([WILT-616821](#)) metal working debris.
