Copper alloy object possibly part of Roman military equipment. The object is broken at both ends, it has a central shaft which is circular in section, and tapers towards on end. At the other end of the shaft on one side starts a wing, which flares out in a crescent shape, with a concave edge, this 'wing' ends as the shaft starts to taper, the side of the wing that leads to the shaft is vertical and just before the shaft has a slight indentation, convex groove. This groove and the tapering of the shaft would suggest that this object fitted into something else, possibly another piece of metal. On the wing of the object is slight decoration, with two line grooves following the curve of the wing, after these grooves and before the shaft are circular indentations which follow the same curve of the lines. The exact design is difficult to make out because this object is heavily eroded.
