A gold brooch with a plain thin frame formed into the shape of an asymmetric heart.

The brooch is delicate, but complete. The frame is 1.5mm thick and eliptical in cross-section. The pin is present and is secured around the frame at the point where the side of the heart is more accentuated, or outwardly curved, and is narrowed to accomodate it. The collar of the pin is 3.5mm long and is curled around to fit the narrowed frame exactly, It has been soldered to create the impression of a solid tube. The tip of the pin touches the back of the smaller curve of the heart.

Dimensions: 24mm long. 21mm wide. 1.5mm thick. Weight: 1.69g.

Parallels and discussion:

Such brooches were used as love tokens during this period and some surviving examples carry inscriptions of amatory intent.

A 14th century asymmetric heart brooch, richly enamelled with flowers and clasped-hands motifs, was bequeathed to the British Museum by A.W. Franks (accession number AF.2701). For a simpler and closer comparison in silver, recently acquired by the British Museum, see Treasure Annual Report 2000, no.140 (Weeting-with-Broomhill, Norfolk).

A very similar gold brooch was submitted for Treasure in 2001 (2001T15). There are several similar brooches made of silver. See 2012T531 for a discussion of some of these.

This brooch along with those mentioned above have been recorded with a medieval date. However, the asymmetrical style does seem to have been one in use for a long period, as one recorded at CAMHER-9AB1F2 has been dated to the 18th century as it is set with marcasite. Despite that later example and longevity of style, the recorder is confident that this brooch fits into the Medieval date.
