A hammered silver penny of King Coenwulf of Mercia dating to the Early Medieval period (c. AD 796-821) struck by Æthelmod at Canterbury. The obverse depicts a legend reading COENVVLF REX arranged circumferentially around a central circle and an M (for Mercia) within it. The reverse depicts a voided Tribrach moline consisting of two lines that divides the name of the moneyer Æthelmod (EþELMOD), with a triangular-shaped pellet in the 'MOD' sector. A similar coin with identical obverse and reverse legends but with a circular pellet under 'MOD' is recorded on the Portable Antiquities Scheme database (CPAT-4AAF81).
