An incomplete Medieval or post-Medieval copper-alloy vessel leg/foot probably from a cauldron, skillet or ewer (c. 1200-c. 1800).

The pot leg is trapezoidal in plan and cross-section.

The front has a central vertical rib that flares towards the break at the top. The back is flat and plain. The old break at the top is irregular and the base is uneven and pitted.

This leg/foot is light green with patches of a darker green patina and consolidated soot.

Length: 27.7mm; width at bottom: 45.0mm; thickness: 21.5mm. Weight: 79.71g.

The vessels to which these were attached were usually of a tripod form and were widely used from c. 1200-1700 for serving and cooking. Butler and Green (2003) 15, state 'there is evidence that (cast copper alloy) metal cooking vessels became increasingly common during the 13th and 14th centuries'. While certain specialist cast copper alloy vessels such as skillets remained in use for longer, 'bronze cauldrons in general seem to have been superseded in the early years of the 18th century by cast iron which were cheaper to make and more durable' (ibid; 22).
